It is gratifying to perceive that this disease is on the decline, and it is to be hoped that in a short time we may be entirely clear of it. On comparing the report of last week with that of this week, the decrease, both in the number of deaths and new cases, is very considerable. The necessity of abstaining from spirits and fruit, and keeping their houses clean cannot be too strongly impressed on the minds of all, especially of the labouring classes. Great attention ought to be paid to keeping the gutters in the streets clean; if many parts of the town they are extremely filthy. All nuisances ought to be removed, and no accumulation of ashes ought to be allowed in any part of the town. In Catherine Street there is a large yard which is used as a receptacle for all kinds of filth, and as it is in the immediate neighbourhood of numerous poor families it should be removed, and not be suffered to be again accumulated. It is in front of the building called Solomon's Temple, and we call the attention of the Board of Health to it in order to cause steps to be taken for its removal.
