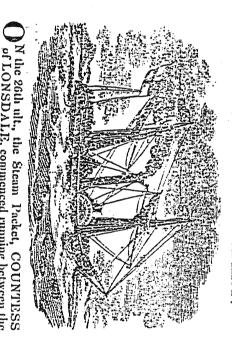

THE UNION STEAM BOAT.

Sin.—Permit me through the median of your paper to correct the erroneous statements which have appeared in various journals, relating to the steam bent Union, of which vessel I am unater, on her late voyage from Liverpool to Maryport.

We sailed from George's Pier at a little before ten on the morning of the 26th ult, with a strong wind about M.N.N. and a considerable of the Ploaling Light, the vessel was struck by a tiemendous sea, which have coming on, and as the gale continued to increase, our situation became most alarming: it required all our exertious to keep the vessel iree, and having only our causa to truck to, we set as much asil a wee could carry and hore sway for Pille of Foultey. About eleven o'clock we discovered Pile light, which was iniled with gladness by all on beard, and aided by Divine Providence we reached the harbour, and alout half par's one in the morning I run the vessel on the ground. Finding that we were able to gain upon the leak and keep her alout, we awong her off into deep water again, as the title flowed, and engaged men from the shore to relieve our own crew, which we steam beat Windermere was lying in the harbour at a short distance from us, I hailed the master and requested that he would our anchor; but owing to the strong wind that prevailed, the attempt did not succeed; for the Windermere was obliged to let go of us and we again; camn to anchor.

In about half an hear I veighed anchor a second time, and run any vessel or a bank to keevard, without any further assistance, and succeeded in finding out the leak, when the title elbed. On the following mornary we backed the vessel of again, and were prepared to preseed on our voyage—By publishing these facts in your journal you will oblige, Sir, your very huntle servent.
