Report of the Select Vestry for the Tawaship of Whitehaven, for the Past year, the Select Vestry for the Gurulian and Overseers for the past year, the Select Vestry have great pleasure in stating that the expenditure has been considerably less than during any year since the affairs of the poor were placed under their present mode of management. The decrease has not been occasioned by any diminution in the anount of relief granted to applicants entitled to and deserving parochialail, but by a steady adherence on the part of the Vestry to the system adopted by their predecessors. It will be perceived, on comparing the Guardian's account for the present year, with that of the year ending 23th March, 1837, that there is a decrease of 1052, 1s. in the payments to the nut-poor resid... in Whitehaven. The casual relief affirded to the side and other poor, not likely to be permanent by supers, does not materially differ from 2.2 disbursements of former years.

The total expenditure is 2352. 6s. 7d. being 2202, 9s. 11d. Is without the side and other poor, not likely to be permanent of the business intrusted to his care, and unanimously recommend his re-appointment.
